The foundation National Anti Doping Agency of Germany (NADA) is the relevant institution for clean sport in Germany. It works nationally and internationally to promote fairness, transparency and equal opportunities for all athletes. Its tasks comprise implementation of a standardised testing for Germany, execution of education and doping prevention measures, issuing Therapeutic Use Exemptions and answering medical inquiries, providing legal advice for federations and athletes, as well as international cooperation. NADA thus essentially contributes to preserving value in sports.

In July 2002, NADA was founded with a festive act in the Old City Hall of Bonn and has been recognised by the foundation supervisory authority on 21 November in the same year. Since then, it has been pursuing its valuable mission and supports the athletes who honestly pursue their sport. As a non-profit foundation under public law, financed according to the stakeholder model, it is an independent body. NADA opposes doping in sports nationally and internationally alike. For the future of the sport. For Germany as a sports nation. For clean athletes, for transparent success and honest results.

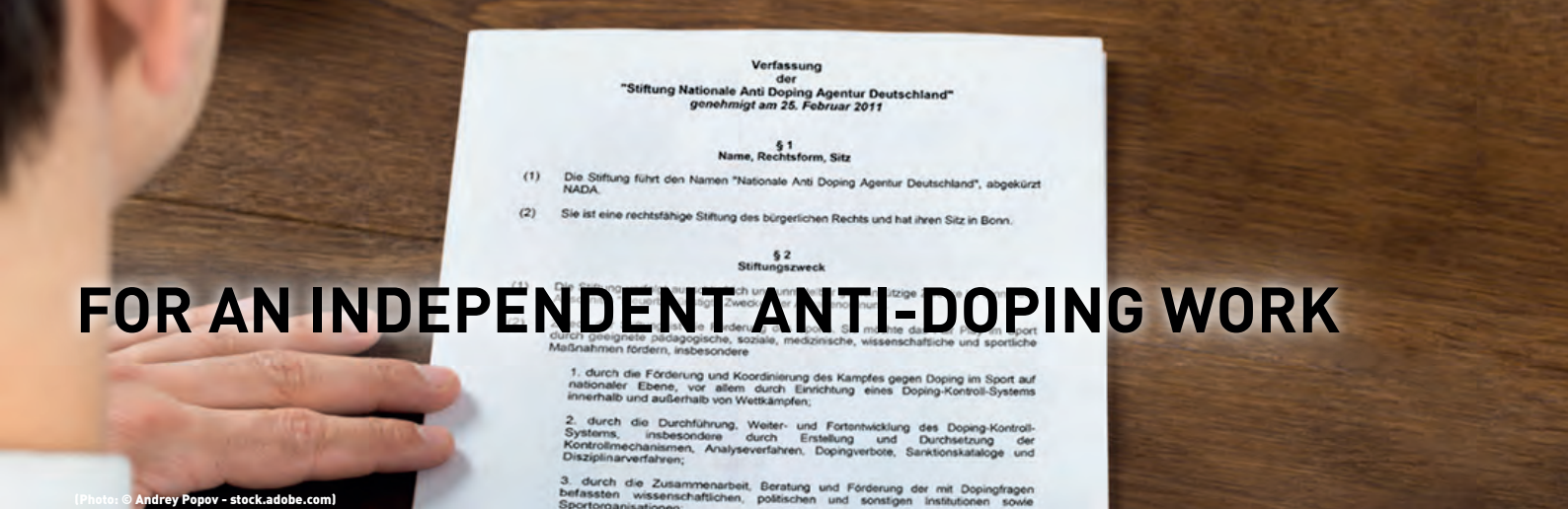

# FOR AN INDEPENDENT ANTI-DOPING WORK

In 2017, the National Anti Doping Agency of Germany (NADA) celebrated its 15th anniversary. Since its creation, NADA has been working towards clean sport and the protection of clean athletes from doping. Today, the foundation can look back on the successful development of its work. NADA's structures as an independent anti-doping agency are well-established, and the financing of the foundation has been sustainably secured by Federal support. NADA is now one of the largest, most up-to-date and leading anti-doping organisations in the world.

One of NADA's central tasks is the prevention work and instruction of athletes on all legal and organisational aspects of the testing programme. NADA's prevention programme „TOGETHER AGAINST DOPING“, initiated in 2010, has been awarded project of the month of July by the state prevention council of North Rhine-Westphalia. And the athletes are doing their part by being available for unannounced doping tests every day and thereby tolerating a considerable restriction of their personal rights.

NADA is extensively committed to further develop modern governance structures in international anti-doping management. Since the publication of the investigations on Russian state doping, NADA has been promoting the re-organisation of the international anti-doping management globally and called for a World Anti-Doping Agency that is independent from sport and appropriately funded.

This is vital in the greatest crisis of sport. NADA goes forward along this route joined by its partners, the athletes, control labs and leading anti-doping organisations around the world, in order to restore credibility and equal opportunities in sporting competitions.

The importance of an independent voice for the athletes has become clear in this crisis. NADA welcomes the initiative of the German athletes and supports the formation of their professional work for the future. This is fundamental because responsible athletes put their experience and expertise from everyday life in competitive sports to work for an effective advancement of anti-doping management in Germany and internationally.

Along with the Supervisory Board, the Executive Board and staff of NADA, we set out to preserve and promote the values of equal opportunities, fairness and tolerance in the future. NADA wants to make a sustainable contribution to the advocacy for clean athletes.

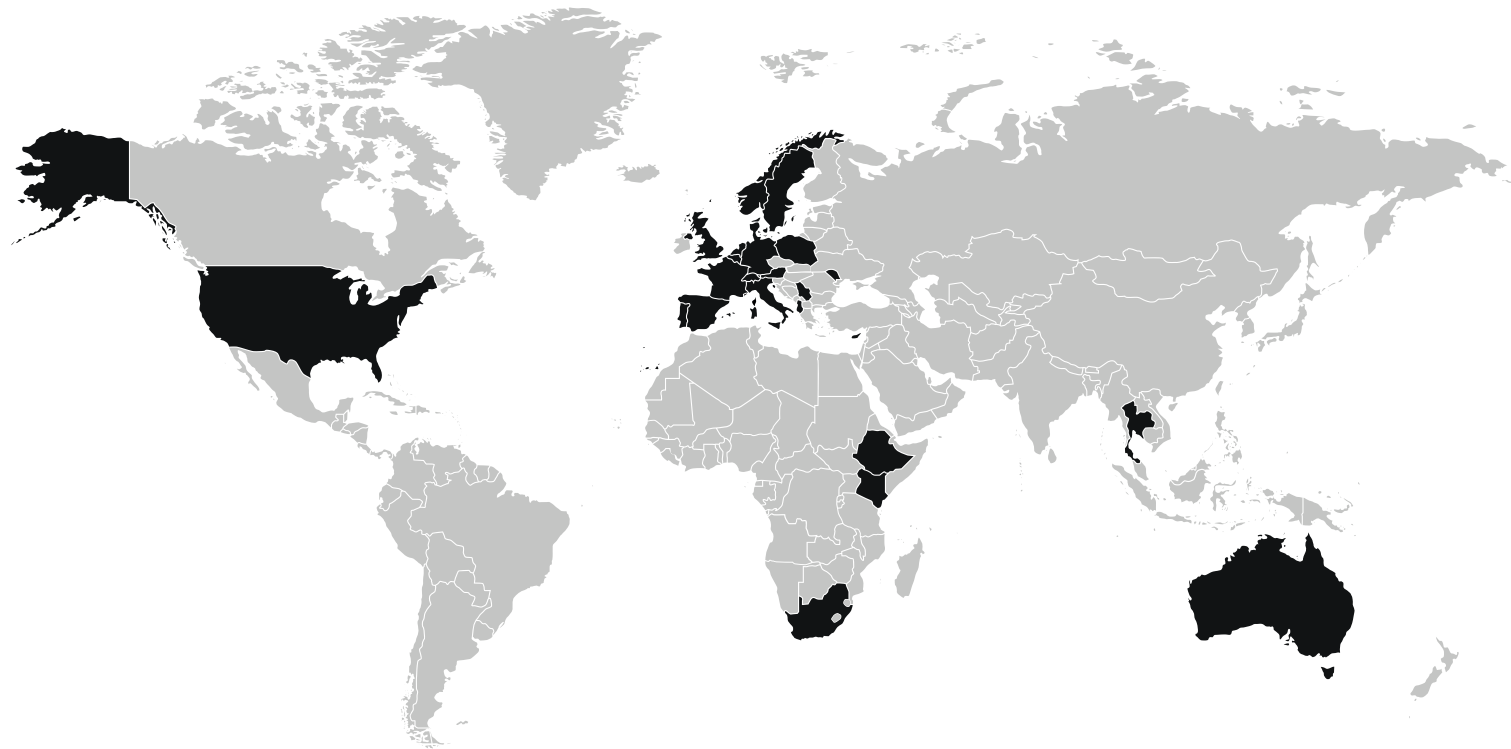

NADA carries out tests of German athletes during their time abroad as well. In 2017, for instance, in Albania, Australia, Austria, Belgium, Cyprus, Denmark, Ethiopia, France, Great Britain, Italy, Kenya, Liechtenstein, Moldova, Monaco, the Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Sweden, Switzerland, Serbia, Spain, South Africa, Thailand and the United States of America.

#### **Pre-Olympic testing programme**

In order to coordinate doping tests before the Olympic Games in PyeongChang (South Korea), the International Olympic Committee (IOC) installed a Pre-Games Anti-Doping Taskforce to make recommendations, for example, on the number of tests, additional analyses and long-term storage. NADA implemented the recommendations of the Pre-Games Anti-Doping Taskforce.

In April 2017, the pre-Olympic testing programme for the potential German participants had an early start. Until the nomination in January 2018, 1,111 tests had been conducted among the pool of 415 potential candidates, with 1,719 samples being taken. For the first time, samples of all Olympic competitors were put into long-term storage. In addition, special complementary analyses have been carried out, for example, for ITPP\*, Cobalt and siRNA\*, completed by a systematic evaluation of analytical data from the athletes' biological passports.

For the pool of 19 potential athletes for the Paralympic Games in PyeongChang 20 tests were conducted until nomination in January 2018, with 26 samples being taken.

#### **Long-term storage and re-analyses**

Long-term storage of samples is an integral part of an unpredictable testing programme. Samples may be stored for up to ten years. In 2017, NADA's anti-doping testing programme had all remaining samples from 2009 and 2010 re-examined for long-term metabolites of the anabolic steroids Oxandrolone, Dehydrochloromethyltestosterone, Metandienone and Stanozolol, selected SARMs\*, various HIF\* stabilisers and GHRFs\*. Among these, samples of still-active athletes. All tests were negative.

#### **International cooperation**

In 2017, Germany was the venue for numerous international competitions. Contributing to international cooperation, NADA carried out in-competition tests for various International Federations, for example, at the Bobsleigh and Skeleton World Championships at Lake Königssee or the World Table Tennis Championships and the World Fencing Championships.

## Results management and disciplinary proceedings

In 2017, NADA's legal department dealt with 82 possible anti-doping rule violations. 16 arbitration proceedings were initiated by NADA. In another 66 cases NADA started investigations within the results management.

## Transfer of administrative review

In May 2017, NADA transferred the administrative review on reporting obligations and potential missed tests to the lawyers' firm SportsLawyer. Since then SportsLawyer has taken over those reviews as an independent body outside of NADA. Previously the legal department of the German Olympic Sports Confederation had carried out this task.

## Compliance

NADA was reviewed by WADA as to its compliance with the World Anti-Doping Code (WADC) in 2017. NADA was declared compliant after the successful completion of the review. WADA comments and proposals were adopted and implemented by NADA in 2017/2018.

## Data security

In recent years NADA has taken comprehensive measures to protect athletes' data and personality, constantly in accordance with the relevant legal provisions. In view of previous hacker attacks, NADA demands that data and privacy of German athletes receive similar protection and corresponding security standards internationally as well (e.g. by International Federations, the IOC and IPC).

## Significant innovation of NADAmEd

In 2017, NADA's prevention and medical departments started a cooperation to refine the medicine database. The new database will continue to run under the name of NADAmEd and will replace the previous database in the future. NADAmEd will then be connected to the medicine database of mmi – Medizinische Medien Informations GmbH. There will be a new scan feature for smartphones. This will enable athletes to scan the barcode of the medicine and receive immediate information on its doping relevance.

## Department

Dr. Anja Scheiff, previously a staff member in the department of medicine of NADA, has taken over the directive of the department in September 2017.

## International matters

Dr. Sebastian Thormann, chair of NADA's Medical Commission, has been appointed to the expert group for Therapeutic Use Exemption (TUE Expert Group) of WADA for 2018. This committee deliberates on the international cooperation and harmonisation in the area of TUEs.

## Prevention projects

Doping prevention makes an impact through cooperation. That is why NADA organised a first network event with athletes' representatives, coaches and anti-doping officers of National Federations. As part of its prevention programme „TOGETHER AGAINST DOPING“ the meeting event aimed at the structural bundling of prevention measures and to sustainably invigorate doping prevention.

Another new addition is the expansion of the prevention programme to the club level, for which NADA designed the concept in cooperation with clubs in 2017. The project was planned with a pilot phase and shall be available to all clubs for competitive sports in Germany in future.

Due to the financial commitment of all Federal States doping prevention work on the federal state level was further expanded. Not only concerning the cooperation with the federal state sports associations but doping prevention in schools as well. This includes the provision of teaching materials and the execution of workshops. Another important aim is to anchor doping prevention in the curricula. The prevention programme of NADA has been awarded project of the month of July by the State Prevention Council of North Rhine-Westphalia.

On the Federal level, prevention projects took place in particular in the top sport sector. One focus of prevention work in 2017 was the training of participants in the Olympic Games.

The annual press conference in Berlin in June and the journalist workshop in Bonn in October provided media representatives with information about the work of NADA. Thus, NADA presented the testing process, procedure of filing failures and missed tests, and the subject of doping prevention in fitness and popular sports. ## Initiatives for clean sports

On a national level, NADA organised a day for clean performance at the Bonner SC with its initiative „GIVE EVERYTHING, TAKE NOTHING“. Video campaigns at the start of the Tour de France or the World Table Tennis Championships drew attention to the subject. Apart from this, NADA brought its live tool to many events, among others to ESL ONE and the disabled athlete election.

## Financial situation

The business year ended with a positive result of 163 thsd. €. It was possible to balance out most of the lack of financial support from economic sponsors through prevailing funds of the Federal Government, continuous contributions of sports and by savings. Stable financing for the foundation tasks is currently ensured.

The Federal Government contributed a grant of 3,606 thsd. € to the operative business of NADA. The states contributed to financing of doping prevention activities collectively with an amount of 465 thsd. €. The sport provided an amount of 2,921 thsd. €. 2017 was the first year without any financial contributions by the economy. Despite its continuous professionalization in the area of marketing, NADA was unable to acquire any new partners from the economy.

The overall budget of the operative business amounted to about 9.4 million €. This includes Federal funds of about 2.1 million € that were passed on to the WADA-accredited labs in Cologne and Kreischa to fund research and analyses.

## Exchange with WADA

been a member of the INADO Board of Directors since 2014.

Exchange with other anti-doping organisations is essential for harmonising the anti-doping work worldwide. The past year saw several meetings of leading NADOs to improve international anti-doping work. The D-A-CH group, comprising the German-speaking NADOs from Austria, Switzerland and Germany, also met in order to develop the work in these countries further. Colleagues from Australia, Denmark and Japan came to Germany, too, for an international exchange.

# REPORT OF THE DATA PROTECTION OFFICER

Handling and protection of personal data at NADA required numerous measures in 2017, too. The persons in charge also had to deal with the coming into effect of the EU general data protection regulation (EU GDPR) in May 2018.

## **New database put into service**

A new database system that combines six formerly separate IT applications was put into service by at the turn of the year 2016/17. This specifically affects the proceedings to perform and plan doping controls, use of ADAMS by NADA and handling of medical data. A database management system facilitates handling of personal data for users, prevents data redundancy, but also brings about certain risks for personal data due to increased user access to the data inventory. In order to diminish these risks, NADA has set up a user management with a differentiated rights/role concept and further safety measures.

The new system was subject to a legally required data-protection advance inspection regarding its risks by the author. There were no concerns about the type and scope of data processing, since they are within the scope of the NADC and the German data protection act. It must be noted that currently data are still processed in Excel applications in addition to the database. The erasure routine and logging of these data could not be reviewed at the time of the inspection, because erasure is scheduled for the start of the next calendar year and logging is performed by an external service provider. Thus, the database requires further observation under data protection law. The new system also required an adjustment of the process directory according to § 4g para. 2 German data protection act.

## **NADAJus database**

NADA has been operating its database NADAJus for two years, in order to publish the decisions in anti-doping proceedings under sports law. NADA is obliged to do this by articles 14.3.2 of the WADC and 10.13 of the NADC,

respectively. Contrary to the specifications of the WADC, however, the NADA website only publishes the first name and the first letter of the last name of the sanctioned athletes, since disclosure of the full name online is incompatible with the principles of proportionality under data protection law. This procedure is also approved by the relevant data protection supervisory authority. WADA, by contrast, demanded that NADA publish the sanction decisions with the full names of the athletes online with reference to the wording of article 14.3.2 WADC (pillory function).

In agreement with the Federal Ministry of the Interior and State Commissioner for Data Protection of North Rhine-Westphalia, NADA holds a restrictive point of view regarding the publication of sanction decisions. The NADAJus publication practice to date will therefore continue. Alternatively, NADA will suggest a modified procedure considering the national and European data protection specifications to WADA that would permit access to the names of the athlete by a limited user group (e.g. sport association, event organisers) that can prove a legitimate interest in knowledge of the athletes' data. Additionally, further safety measures (e.g. password protection) should be taken to prevent unauthorised access.

NADA offered to publish only the first names and initials (first letters) of the last names of the athletes concerned online. This proposal has yet to be checked for its compliance with data protection regulations by the relevant data protection authority. In addition, NADA and its NADO colleagues in the EU should find a procedure that is compatible with the strict criteria of the EU GDPR once it has entered into force.

### **EU General Data Protection Regulation (EU GDPR)**

As of 25 May 2018, the EU will be subject to a uniform data protection law. The EU GDPR will enter into effect on that day, after the previous approval by the European Parliament in May 2016. In contrast to the data protection directive 95/46/EC, the regulation creates directly applicable law. However, it still contains quite a few flexibility clauses that allow member states to introduce deviating provisions for certain areas. German lawmakers were among those who utilized this option, by passing the data protection adjustment and implementation law, and the German data protection act new along with it. The deviations apply, among others, to the right to information (article 15 EU GDPR) and processing of special types of personal data (e.g. health data, see article 9 EU GDPR).

When handling personal data at NADA, data protection has already enjoyed high priority. Anyhow, the general regulation poses new requirements to the protection of such data; this applies to the technical and organisational measures for data protection, as well as the rights of the data subjects. The greatest possible degree of transparency is stipulated, i.e. all data processing measures and their effects for the data subjects must be recorded; violations under data protection law must be reported to the supervisory authorities. Violations are liable to heavy fines.

NADA has either initiated the required steps to introduce the new regulations or is about to do so. These include

- appointment of an external IT officer for data security,
- analysis of the existing provisions on data protection and data security,
- documentation of these provisions
- data protection impact assessment according to article 35 EU GDPR depending on risk assessment,
- review and adjustment of existing provisions and forms to the new data protection terminology,
- review of the contracts for data processing,
- training of staff,
- outsourcing of the server structure of NADA to an independent computing centre (access control),
- introduction of 2-factor authentication (data access control).

The person or persons responsible (NADA) must take the required technical and organisational measures in order to ensure that the processing of data is carried out according to the EU GDPR.

In 2017, five requests from athletes from the Olympic and non-Olympic disciplines were addressed to the ombudsman for anti-doping matters.

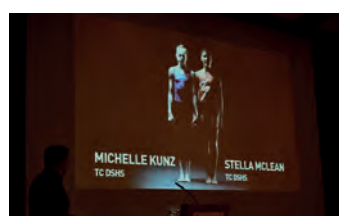
One case was referred directly to NADA, either due to legal components or because of formal questions. Four

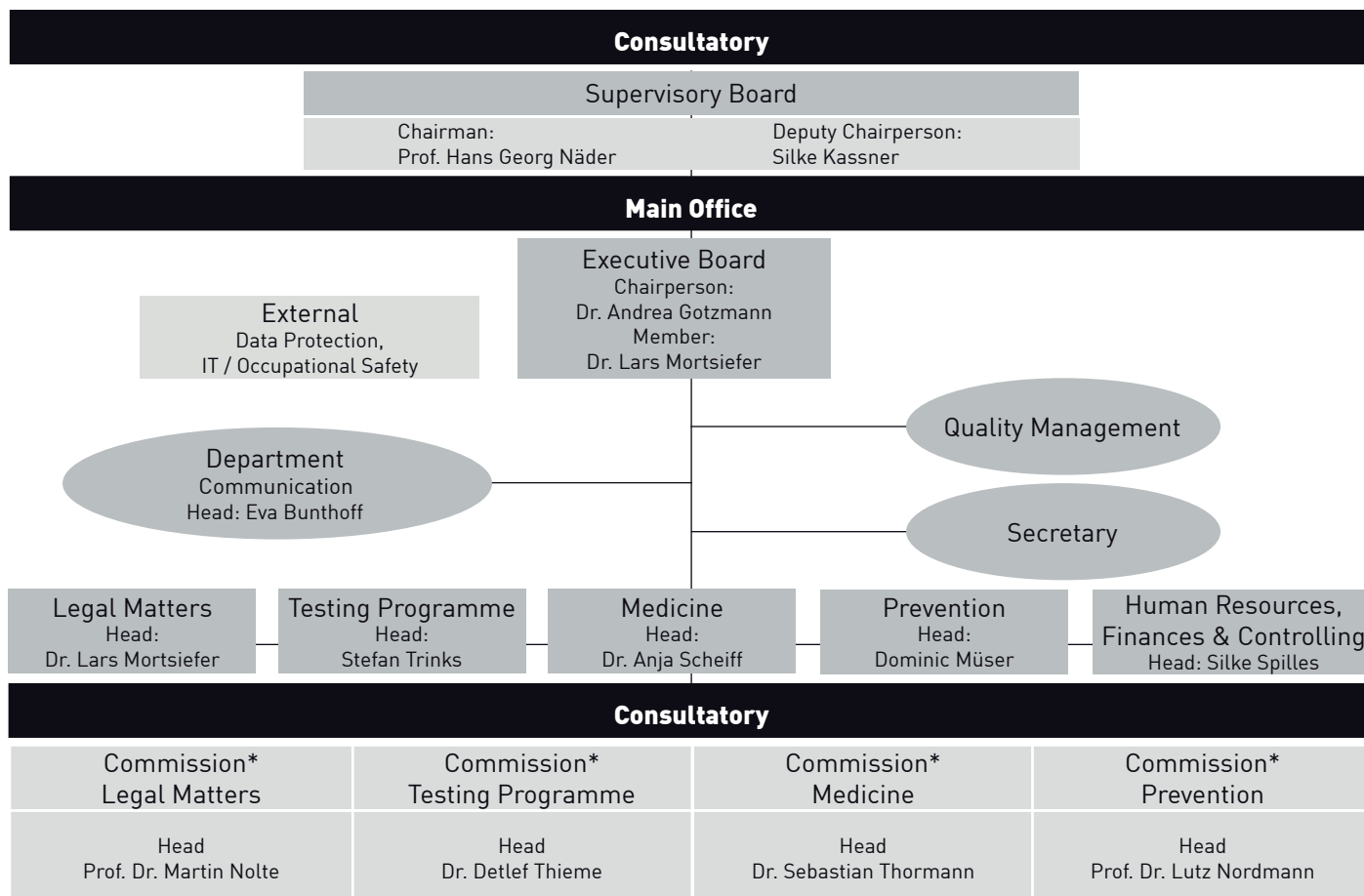
