It promotes fairness, transparency and equal opportunities for all athletes nationally and internationally. Its tasks comprise the implementation of a uniform testing programme for Germany, execution of education, issuing Therapeutic Use Exemptions (TUEs) and answering medical inquiries, providing legal advice for federations and athletes, as well as international cooperation. NADA Germany essentially contributes to preserving values in sports.

In July 2002, NADA Germany was founded with a festive act in the Old City Hall of Bonn and was recognised by the foundation supervisory authority on the 21st of November in the same year. Since then, it has been pursuing its valuable mission and supports athletes who pursue their sport with integrity. As a non-profit foundation under public law, which has been institutionally supported since January 2020, NADA Germany is an independent body. NADA Germany opposes doping in sports nationally and internationally alike.

For the future of sport. For Germany as a sport nation.  
For clean athletes, for transparent success and honest results.

# RESPONSIBILITY AND FURTHER DEVELOPMENT

“The World Anti-Doping Code forms the basis for harmonising international anti-doping efforts. Following a three-year consultation phase, the World Anti-Doping Agency adopted the World Anti-Doping Code 2027 (WADC27) in December 2025. The new set of rules, including all revised standards and guidelines, will come into force on 1 January 2027.

In terms of content, particular emphasis is placed on respect for human rights – especially those of minors and other vulnerable persons. Furthermore, the responsibilities of anti-doping organisations are being expanded. Exclusive and sole responsibility for doping control measures, as well as results management and disciplinary proceedings at national level, lies with the National Anti-Doping Organisations.

Furthermore, a new International Standard will strengthen intelligence and investigative work. NADA Germany played a leading role in drafting the Code and is committed to the future of anti-doping investigations. This work is already yielding results that, in collaboration with other anti-doping bodies, point the way forward.

NADA Germany will implement the revised Code in 2026 in collaboration with the sports federations, whilst maintaining dialogue with its international partners. Cooperation is just as essential for the harmonisation of anti-doping measures and the successful promotion of clean sport as adequate financial support.

Despite the current challenging budgetary and funding situation, NADA Germany will continue to work with its stakeholders from sport, politics, business and science to ensure appropriate and adequate framework conditions, in order to fulfil its statutory mandate for a doping-free sport.”

“Increased training provision in elite sports schools, a new e-learning course for coaches, a new brochure for the school-elite sport partnership scheme, and an increase in the number of institutions within the TOGETHER AGAINST DOPING network: it is a key priority for NADA Germany to ensure that athletes can take part in appropriate prevention measures.

At the same time, the continuous development of the two-pillar model – doping education and the doping testing programme – is a key focus for NADA Germany. For the first time, NADA Germany deployed its own testing personnel for the doping tests it conducted during the FISU World University Games. The further development of NADA Germany’s experts in targeted research and working groups, the organisation of large-scale dried blood spot campaigns, the use of new analytical methods, and the redesign of the pre-Olympic and pre-Paralympic testing programme for the 2026 Winter Games in Milano-Cortina were key priorities in the 2025 doping testing programme.

Clean sport requires the constant adaptation of strategies, greater networking and better use of available data. At the same time, NADA Germany is working on projects involving the use of artificial intelligence and other digital tools to promote clean and fair sport.”

NADA Germany plays a vital role in sport. Through its work, it promotes the values of sport – fairness, tolerance and equality of opportunity. The TOGETHER AGAINST DOPING education programme lays the foundations for honest performance in sport through information tailored to specific target groups. NADA Germany’s doping tests serve to protect clean athletes, as well as the integrity and equality of opportunity in sport.

At the same time, NADA Germany initiates and supports forward-looking projects to further develop anti-doping work. Just as sport is a reflection of our society, NADA Germany’s anti-doping work reflects sporting values. International cooperation for global equality of opportunity is also a key component of NADA Germany’s work.

The goals NADA Germany is striving for may be ambitious. However, the NADA Germany team has built up the high level of expertise required for its intensive day-to-day work. The aim is to maintain, strengthen and expand this expertise in all areas so that NADA Germany remains equipped to meet the demands of the future – particularly in view of the upcoming changes brought about by the revised anti-doping regulations.

Since 2020, NADA Germany has received institutional funding

from the federal government and is therefore financially secured. However, the level of funding varies with the federal budget. The year 2025 was challenging in that not only did the state federal budget make planning difficult, but potential financial cuts resulting from the federal budget were also discussed intensively by the Supervisory Board. To ensure NADA Germany functions effectively in fulfilling its important societal responsibilities, securing the Foundation’s future funding remains essential and continues to be a high priority on the Supervisory Board’s agenda, so that NADA Germany can continue to sustainably safeguard and promote the significant values of sport.

The Supervisory Board would like to thank the Executive Board and the NADA Germany team for their dedicated and high-quality work at national level – as well as in collaboration with other anti-doping organisations at international level.

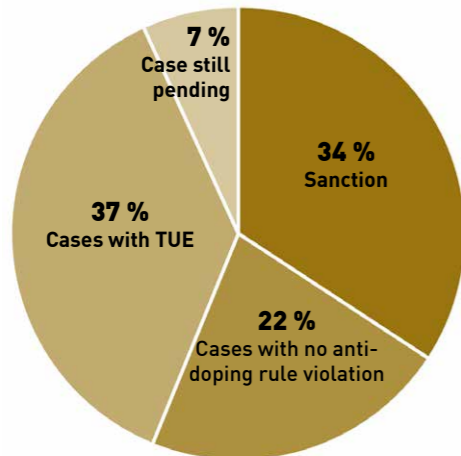

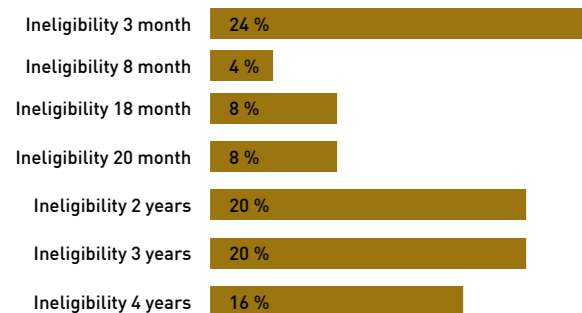

Outcome of the results management and disciplinary proceedings:

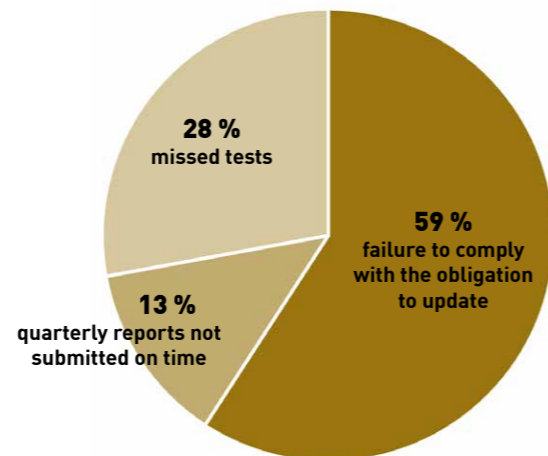


The most commonly detected substances and methods were **anabolic steroids** and **stimulants**.

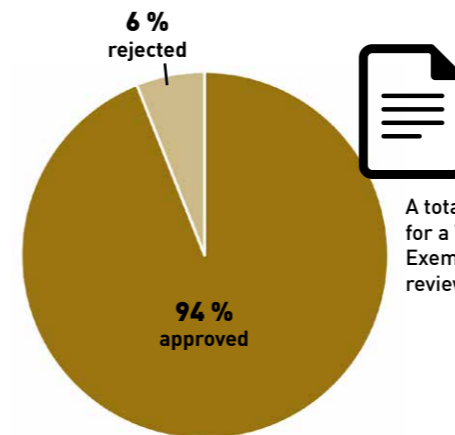

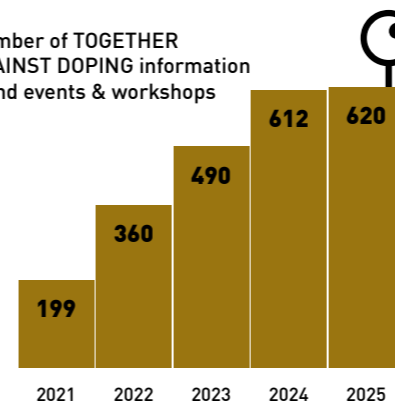

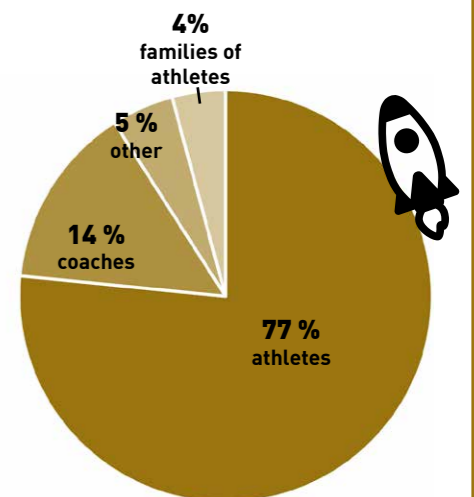

# TESTING

## Major sporting events

NADA Germany was responsible for coordinating doping tests at the FISU World University Games Rhine Ruhr and Berlin, which took place from 16 to 27 July 2025. In total, it carried out 513 in-competition and 60 out-of-competition tests at this event. In August and September 2025, NADA Germany also began preparations for the Winter Olympic and Paralympic Games in Italy with the pre-Olympic and pre-Paralympic testing programme.

## In-house testing staff

NADA Germany has been working with service providers to carry out sample collection for many years. The aim was to complement the existing approach effectively by deploying its own testing staff. NADA Germany successfully deployed its own testing staff for the first time at the FISU World University Games.

## Long-term storage and re-analysis

Thanks to the research activities of the Institute of Biochemistry at the German Sport University Cologne and the Institute for Doping Analysis and Sports Biochemistry in Kreischa, NADA Germany was once again able to carry out an extensive re-analysis programme this year. In a joint project, NADA Germany and the Institute of Biochemistry at the German Sport University Cologne have, for the first time worldwide, applied a new analytical method to so-called Activin Receptor Signalling Pathway Inhibitors (IASPs). In addition, based on information from media reports, NADA Germany, in collaboration with the Institute for Doping Analysis and Sports Biochemistry in Kreischa, re-analysed 350 samples, particularly from endurance sports, for AICAR. The focus was also on the 653 long-term stored samples from 2016. All re-analysed samples were negative.

## International

As part of the collaboration with the National Anti-Doping Organisations, the Science Expert Group was re-established. A meeting of this group took place in Paris in March and another in September 2025 as part of the USADA Science Symposium in Colorado Springs. NADA Germany staff also attended the Testing Expert Group meeting at UK Anti-Doping (UKAD) in London. Furthermore, a professional exchange took place in Paris at the invitation of the French Anti-Doping Organisation (AFLD). In addition, cooperation with the AFLD was intensified as part of a partnership programme. NADA Germany accompanied the work on site in France over several days, whilst, in return, a guest from France was welcomed to Germany.

# LEGAL MATTERS

## Revised Code adopted

At the World Conference on Doping in Sport held in Busan, South Korea, in December 2025, the anti-doping community adopted the revised World Anti-Doping Code, together with the revised standards. This followed a three-year revision process in which NADA Germany was also heavily involved. NADA Germany submitted a large number of proposed amendments, including measures to improve the protection of minors in anti-doping work, strengthen athletes' rights and modify the sanctions system. It also played a leading role in drafting the International Standard for Intelligence and Investigations (ISII). At the same time, NADA Germany actively contributed to the revision process via the Council of Europe, where it led the group on the revision of the Code and the International Standard for Testing (IST). Drawing on its practical experience, NADA Germany contributed to the further harmonisation and practical implementation of the global anti-doping regulations. In 2026, NADA Germany will implement the revised regulations in Germany in order to be ready in time for the WADC27 to come into force on 1 January 2027.

## NADA Germany's publication policy

NADA Germany's publication policy was discussed in the media and in the German Bundestag's Committee on Sport and Voluntary Work in 2025. NADA Germany will continue to pursue a restrictive publication policy as long as there is no legally valid basis for the publication of anti-doping rule violations in online databases. Furthermore, NADA Germany will await the outcome of a review procedure initiated by Austria before the European Court of Justice regarding the publication of doping violations. A landmark decision is expected.

## Filing Failures and Missed Tests

NADA Germany's aim is to reduce Filing Failures and Missed Tests in particular through educational and information measures. These remain at a high level. NADA Germany regularly addresses this issue in all its communications and held several information events on this topic in 2025. In 2025, a total of 487 proceedings concerning possible Filing Failures and Missed Tests were initiated by Notice of Hearing.

## 10 years of the Anti-Doping Act in Germany

On 18 December 2025, the Act on Combating Doping in Sport ("Anti-Doping Act") celebrated its tenth anniversary. Since it came into force on 18 December 2015, it has strengthened the integrity of sporting competition by making the possession, use and trade of prohibited substances a criminal offence, thereby enabling the criminal prosecution of doping athletes and criminal networks.

## 73 possible anti-doping rule violations

In 2025, NADA Germany investigated 63 of a total of 73 possible anti-doping rule violations. Of these, result management proceedings were initiated in 26 cases. NADA Germany issued 26 decisions. Four cases were pending before the German Court of Arbitration for Sport (DIS), three of which dated from 2024 or earlier. Of the proceedings conducted before the DIS, 2 were concluded. Three NADA Germany proceedings were pending before the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS). Two proceedings before the CAS were concluded in 2025. Among the proceedings from 2024 and earlier that were concluded in 2025, a further 8 cases resulted in a ban.

# INTELLIGENCE & INVESTIGATIONS

## Intelligence & Investigations work is growing in importance

The commitment to clean sport increasingly requires an information-based and targeted approach. Alongside traditional doping tests, activities in the field of Intelligence & Investigations are becoming crucial in uncovering systematic, organised and structural doping.

Intelligence & Investigations work aims to proactively identify and structurally counter systematic manipulation, criminal structures and networks, as well as novel or difficult-to-detect doping methods.

## Reorientation of the whistleblower system SPRICH'S AN

Ten years after the introduction of SPRICH'S AN, NADA Germany overhauled its whistleblower system in 2025 and embarked on a strategic reorientation. By adapting the user interface and design, the aim is to make it easier for whistleblowers to submit reports to NADA Germany. In addition, communication measures were expanded to increase brand recognition and emphasise its importance for clean sport.

## National and international cooperation

At the national level, the work of the Intelligence & Investigations unit led to targeted inspections and criminal charges. In collaboration with the Federal Criminal Police Office and the Berlin State Criminal Police Office, the commercial trade in doping substances and medicines in various shops in Berlin was successfully uncovered.

Furthermore, international cooperation is essential for the organisation. Consequently, NADA Germany continued to focus on intensifying and expanding its international cooperation in

2025. In cooperation with WADA, NADA Germany entered into a partnership with the Azerbaijan National Anti-Doping Agency (AMADA) in 2024, with a focus on Intelligence & Investigations. This partnership was continued in 2025. NADA Germany hosted AMADA in Bonn and paid a return visit to Baku to support the establishment of AMADA's intelligence and investigations work.

In addition, NADA Germany took part in a panel discussion on intelligence and investigations organised by the Tunisian National Anti-Doping Organisation and used the opportunity to exchange views with partner organisations there. Further international impetus came from expert meetings with the Sport Human Intelligence Network working group and WADA's Anti-Doping Intelligence and Investigation Network.

Cross-border cooperation in the DACH region was further strengthened. The DACH exchange promotes dialogue between Germany, Austria and Switzerland. Through quarterly exchanges, experiences, best practices and different perspectives are shared at a working level.

## Information events and workshops

The exchange between NADA Germany and WADA-accredited laboratories with public prosecutors, as well as investigating officers from Customs, the Federal Criminal Police Office and individual police stations, was once again facilitated by two exchange meetings organised by NADA Germany.

As part of the Research Initiative on Anti-Doping Criminal Law (FIDoS), an exchange for public prosecutors was organised for the first time at the Düsseldorf Public Prosecutor's Office.

109 Therapeutic Use Exemptions (TUEs) were granted by NADA Germany, whilst 7 TUE applications were rejected.

586 medical enquiries, covering 772 medicinal products, were received and processed by the Medical Department.

347,067 enquiries were made in the NADA Germany medicines database via the website and the NADA2go app.

## Appointment of new members to the NADA Germany Therapeutic Use Exemption Committee

Under the provisions of the anti-doping regulations, the NADA Germany is required to have applications for Therapeutic Use Exemptions (TUEs) assessed by medical specialists. The committee comprises physicians from various specialist fields. In 2025, NADA Germany welcomed three new members to its TUE Committee: a specialist in general practice, pulmonology and cardiology; a specialist in general internal medicine; and a specialist in psychiatry and psychotherapy.

## NADA Germany supports the Prohibited List Expert Advisory Group

Dr Anja Scheiff, Head of the Medical Department, contributed to the drafting of the 2026 Prohibited List as a member of WADA's Prohibited List Expert Advisory Group. The group held digital meetings and convened for in-person meetings in Montreal, Canada.

## Medical information services

The range of information services for healthcare professionals was also expanded in 2025. The Medical Department once again offered digital anti-doping training sessions to physicians on two dates. Participation is recognised as continuing professional development in the anti-doping reports of the national sports federations. Furthermore, the event was certified for continuing professional development credits by the North Rhine Medical Association in 2025. In addition, NADA Germany provided physiotherapists with information on current medical anti-doping topics during a digital training session. Through these three training courses, NADA Germany reached a total of more than 500 interested parties.

To offer athletes and their treating physicians a simple way to find out whether a TUE is required for the athlete in question, NADA Germany made the interactive TUE Navigator available on its website and in the NADA2go app in 2025. In 2025, more than 1,000 people used the TUE Navigator.

# MEDICINE

The use of asthma sprays, cortisone and infusions in sport remain frequently asked topics in the Medical Department, so NADA Germany has revised its medical information leaflets on these subjects. The leaflets have been updated to reflect the regulations of the relevant Prohibited List coming into force from 2026. The leaflets are available both in printed form and for download. In addition, the information sheet "Contamination of meat products abroad" has been updated.

The department provided clarification on the topic of testosterone in sport during a podcast interview. NADA Germany was responding to one of many "lifestyle trends" in which, among other things, medical treatments involving substances and methods on the Prohibited List are offered.

# COMMUNICATION & MARKETING

262 enquiries from journalists, school pupils and students were answered.

Around 11,130 followers on NADA Germany's social media channels on Facebook, X, Instagram, YouTube and LinkedIn.

189,127 downloads of the NADA2go app and 362,020 visitors to the NADA Germany website.

## Public Relations and Events

In 2025, public attention focused in particular on NADA Germany's disclosure practices, the so-called "Enhanced Games" and potential breaches of anti-doping regulations. NADA Germany provided communication support on all these issues and kept the media and the public informed, including at the 2025 annual press conference.

During the year, NADA Germany also engaged with the media on other anti-doping issues, answered enquiries and gave interviews. Furthermore, NADA Germany provided information about its work via press releases, social media and its newsletter. In addition, NADA Germany once again offered a workshop for journalists in Bonn. The event focused on the topic of "contamination as a doping trap", another issue that was of particular interest to the public in 2025. Finswimmer Marek Leipold spoke to participants about his experience with the issue. He won two gold medals at the 2025 World Games in China.

The contact persons from the federations were also an important stakeholder group that was the focus of NADA Germany's communication measures. NADA Germany invited the federations' anti-doping officers to an anti-doping workshop in Bonn. In addition, NADA Germany organised its first digital information event for the federations' communications officers and press officers. The event focused on the communication strategy to be adopted in the event of a potential positive doping case.

Furthermore, the Communications and Marketing Unit presented its work to students at Ansbach University of Applied Sciences and the University of Tübingen, and supported a study project on social media by students at Macromedia University.

## GIVE EVERYTHING, TAKE NOTHING

In 2025, NADA Germany was once again present at various sporting events with its Live-Tool, informing the general public about important anti-doping issues. Particular highlights included visits to the FISU World University Games, Die Finals and the DATEV Challenge Roth. In addition, NADA Germany and the DATEV Challenge Roth also collaborated on a communications level. For example, they published joint press releases and NADA Germany provided texts for the DATEV Challenge Roth website to educate participants about prohibited substances and doping pitfalls.

## Research projects and international cooperation

As a cooperation partner, NADA Germany supported the research project "Top Athletes and the Media: An Analysis of the Perception and Evaluation of Doping Coverage as well as Subjectively Perceived Physical and Mental Performance" at the Technical University of Munich. The international research project "Supporting Anti-Doping via Transforming Athletes' Life Experience after Doping into Education Resources and Policy Recommendations (TALE) - What about us' at the University of Innsbruck continued in 2025.

NADA Germany also held discussions with communication experts from other National Anti-Doping Organisations (NADOs) at meetings of the Communication Expert Group and discussed current topics in anti-doping communication.

# EDUCATION

## TOGETHER AGAINST DOPING Network

Through TOGETHER AGAINST DOPING, NADA Germany is pursuing a participatory network-based approach. This ensures that athletes receive active support from the relevant structural partners at every stage of their sporting development and are thereby supported in developing their anti-doping expertise. The network thus brings together environmental and behavioural prevention approaches. The network partners are given the opportunity to actively bring the needs of the sporting structures into the network and to jointly further develop doping education in Germany. In 2025, NADA Germany was able to recruit further organisations from organised sport to join the network and once again increase the number of members.

In 2025, the TOGETHER AGAINST DOPING network event took place in Cologne in the tried-and-tested cooperation with the Federal Institute of Sport Science (BISp). In addition to inspiring expert input, the focus was above all on the exchange of ideas among the members.

Through annual meetings, NADA Germany also established a direct channel of dialogue with all sports federations, state sports associations and regional sports bodies.

## TOGETHER AGAINST DOPING on the spot

In 2025, NADA Germany recorded a new record high in the number of training sessions and workshops held across the country. With a total of 493 events held, the education and prevention initiatives of TOGETHER AGAINST DOPING were in greater demand than ever before. Through its on-site formats, NADA Germany targeted both its core audience of young and elite athletes and the wider sporting community, including coaches and support staff.

A particular highlight was the FISU World University Games Rhine Ruhr and Berlin, where NADA Germany was represented with a comprehensive prevention programme and set up information stands at several venues. In addition,

during the event period, NADA Germany offered workshops for athletes to provide the target group with targeted information on-site regarding anti-doping knowledge relevant to daily life, rights and obligations, and testing procedures.

The presence within the integrated system of schools and elite sport was also particularly significant in 2025. By systematically embedding doping education in schools, NADA Germany promotes early initial contact and thus contributes significantly to the sustainable communication of values and raising awareness in youth competitive sport.

In cooperation with the German Olympic Academy (DOA), NADA Germany also once again ran a training course for teachers from various types of schools under the motto "Olympic – Fair – Clean".

## TOGETHER AGAINST DOPING digital

In 2025, a total of around 30,000 subscribers registered with the TOGETHER AGAINST DOPING E-Learning Academy, of whom some 21,700 users successfully completed the learning objectives of the introductory course, Anti-Doping Basics, and received a certificate.

In March and June 2025, two e-learning courses were published for the target group of coaches. These were developed in cooperation with the German Olympic Sports Confederation (DOSB) Coaching Academy in Cologne and complement the existing provision for coaches in elite youth sport. In addition, in 2025, NADA Germany published an e-learning course in consultation with the DOSB for participants in the European Youth Olympic Festival (EYOF) and the Winter EYOF 2025. Furthermore, NADA Germany trained the international participants of the FISU World University Games using a specially developed English-language e-learning course.

## Research projects

The Education Department provided advisory support for the research project "New Challenges in the Field of Doping Prevention" and circulated relevant calls for participation to stakeholders. NADA Germany presented the project together with the BISp and the Institute for Sports Law at the German Sport University Cologne.

The focus is on the resulting obligations of NADA Germany and the national federations in the field of doping prevention. The results show that the version of the International Standards for Education (ISE) published for the first time in 2021 establishes binding requirements for the planning, implementation, documentation, coordination and evaluation of anti-doping programmes and strengthens NADA Germany's role as a national centre of expertise, including in the field of awareness-raising and educational work.

## International

For the ninth time, international experts in doping education gathered at the Education Summit of the Penrose Education Experts and Resource Sharing (PEERS) group in Colorado Springs. Participants came from countries including Germany, Denmark, Japan, Austria, Switzerland, the USA, Australia and the United Kingdom.

# HUMAN RESOURCES, FINANCE & CONTROLLING

## Business Performance and Financial Position of the Foundation

Since the 2020 financial year, NADA Germany has received funding from the Federal Ministry of the Interior and Homeland (BMI) as part of institutional funding. Following the formation of the new government, responsibility was transferred to the Federal Chancellery (BKAm) on 1 November 2025.

In 2025, too, necessary procedural adjustments to business operations were continuously implemented in accordance with grant and procurement law requirements, applying the General Ancillary Provisions for Grants for Institutional Funding (ANBest-I).

The Federal Government contributed 7.38 million euros to NADA Germany's operational activities. The federal states jointly contributed 639,000 euros to the funding of anti-doping education. The sports sector contributed approximately 1.74 million euros.

The total budget for operational activities amounted to approximately 13.04 million euros. This includes federal funds of approximately 2.2 million euros, which were transferred to the WADA-accredited laboratories in Cologne and Kreischa to finance research and analysis.

The inflation adjustment still received in 2024 was no longer received by NADA Germany in 2025. NADA Germany countered the loss of the inflation adjustment in particular through synergies in the area of intelligent testing planning and by optimising expenditure items in the conduct of doping tests. This enabled NADA Germany to offset the rise in costs associated with conducting testing and to maintain a consistent testing frequency for out-of-competition and in-competition testing. A further hurdle was the so-called provisional budget management, meaning that NADA Germany was able to operate only to a very limited extent and incur necessary expenditure to

fulfil its statutory duties for virtually the entire 2025 financial year. It was not until the start of the fourth quarter that the provisional budget management was concluded, thereby enabling the full utilisation of funds.

In addition, in 2025, NADA Germany initiated status determination proceedings to assess and evaluate, in accordance with pension insurance law, the Doping Control Personnel deployed by NADA Germany for the FISU World University Games Rhine Ruhr and Berlin, as well as Doping Control Personnel for horse Testing.

Overall, the financial year 2025 yields a positive conclusion. Financial support from the federal government, the states and the sports sector made it possible to maintain NADA Germany's operational activities as planned.

In 2025, the certification was once again confirmed following the routine surveillance audit of NADA Germany regarding the proper implementation of the internationally recognised standard DIN EN ISO 9001:2015.

As at 31 December 2025, NADA Germany employed 39 full-time staff, 5 part-time staff and seven marginal employees.

### Notes to the table

In accordance with the General Auxiliary Provisions on Institutional Funding, NADA Germany achieved a balanced annual result in terms of income and expenditure, as required by budgetary law.

NADA Germany's annual financial statements are audited annually by an external auditor. This audit did not lead to any objections for the year 2025.

# INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION

## Participation in WADA's international committees

Following a proposal from NADA Germany and with the support of the Minister of State for Sport and Volunteering, Dr Schenderlein, WADA has appointed Dr Marc Wonneberger, Head of the Anti-Doping Department at the Federal Institute of Sport Science (BISp) and Chair of NADA Germany's Education Commission, to WADA's Education Standing Committee. His term of office begins on 1 January 2026 and lasts for three years. NADA Germany has been committed to improving the Anti-Doping Administration & Management System (ADAMS) for many years. In 2025, Léa Krüger, Deputy Chair of the Supervisory Board of NADA Germany and Vice-President of Athleten Deutschland e.V., actively contributed her experience as an athlete to the WADA group tasked with redesigning ADAMS.

## Strengthening European cooperation

NADA Germany is involved in international exchanges for clean sport within the Council of Europe. It participates actively in the various working groups. For instance, the Council of Europe's Advisory Group on Education and Prevention was hosted in Bonn for a two-day meeting at NADA Germany's invitation. The aim of this exchange was to strengthen European cooperation in the field of doping prevention and to discuss new approaches. NADA Germany also took part in the second meeting in Turkey at the end of 2025 to discuss doping prevention issues.

NADA Germany also took part in the conference "Bringing European NADOs Together to Strengthen the National Systems", which was organised by the Council of Europe and the Norwegian Anti-Doping Organisation. The conference focused on exchange and cooperation between European National Anti-Doping Organisations (NADOs) to strengthen their independence and make national and international anti-doping work more effective.

## Participation in international initiatives

NADA Germany played an active role in iNADO webinars and in working with international partner organisations to develop a joint set of recommendations for improving the Anti-Doping Administration and Management System (ADAMS).

## Expansion of international partnerships

The partnership programme with the NADO from Azerbaijan continued in 2025. Cross-border exchange within the DACH region remains a key priority for NADA Germany. In addition to joint cooperation within the DACH region, the group was expanded to include Luxembourg, Liechtenstein and Belgium. Within this framework, NADA Germany took part in an exchange visit to Belgium.

# DATA PROTECTION ACTIVITY REPORT

Reporting period: 1 January 2025 – 31 December 2025

## Role and involvement of the external data protection officer

During the reporting period, the external data protection officer acted in an advisory and supervisory capacity in accordance with Article 39 of the GDPR. She had no operational responsibility or decision-making authority in matters relating to data protection. She was regularly involved through scheduled meetings and on an ad hoc basis in matters relevant to data protection.

## Summary

Cooperation between the NADA Germany coordination team and the contact persons at SITS Deutschland GmbH was consistently very constructive and efficient throughout the reporting period. This is attributable in particular to the established regular meetings and the ad hoc direct involvement of the data protection officers. This ongoing involvement confirms the high level of awareness among staff regarding data protection issues. The establishment and further development of the data protection management system (DPMS) were consistently pursued during the reporting period. The large number of cases processed and results achieved demonstrates the effectiveness of the measures implemented. A core element of a data protection management system is continuous improvement, which is why existing measures must be regularly reviewed for completeness and effectiveness. Furthermore, new regulatory requirements and changes in the system and process landscape must be continuously assessed. To this end, it is necessary to maintain sufficient resources both for regular data protection tasks and for requirements arising at short notice.

## Issues/cases handled during the reporting period

During the reporting period, a request from data subjects in accordance with Chapter III of the GDPR was answered within the prescribed time limit. The requests mainly concerned requests for information under Article 15 of the GDPR.

In addition, two data protection incidents were identified, assessed, reported and resolved. Where necessary, reports were made to the competent supervisory authority in accordance with Article 33 of the GDPR, and data subjects were notified in accordance with Article 34 of the GDPR.

Data processing agreements pursuant to Article 28 of the GDPR are reviewed by NADA Germany.

During the reporting period, 18 apps/tools and service providers were assessed for compliance with data protection law prior to deployment, and the underlying processes were analysed. In cases where these assessments indicated a likely high risk to the rights and freedoms of data subjects, data protection impact assessments were carried out in accordance with Article 35 of the GDPR. This was done on one occasion prior to the introduction of new HR software. Furthermore, policies and guidelines were subjected to a data protection review.

## Status and Outlook

Overall, the reporting period shows an increasing level of maturity in the organisation and processes relating to data protection. For the coming year, it is recommended that existing measures be further consolidated, regular reviews continued and, in particular, that changes to the IT and tool landscape continue to be supported from an early stage in accordance with data protection law.

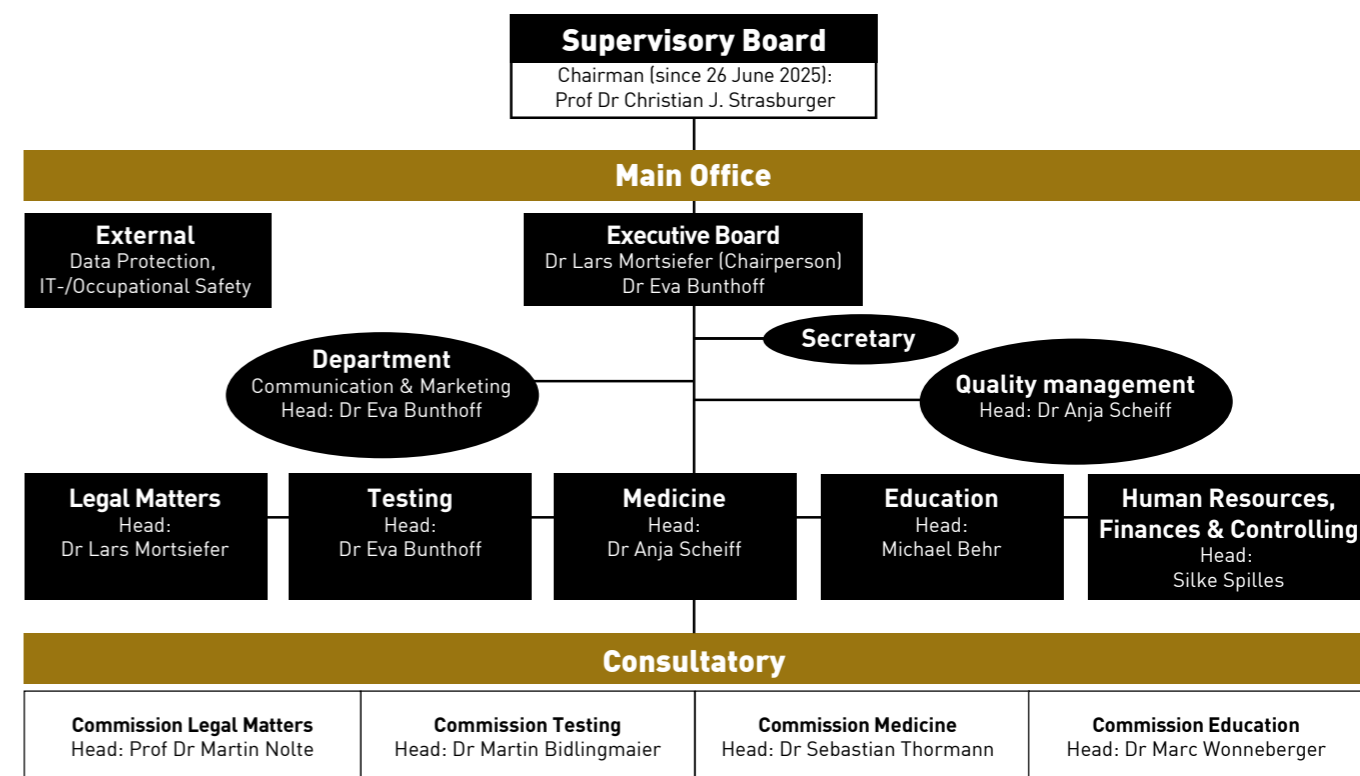
